We were at the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues again this year, and were thrilled to be joined by 15-year-old Haana Edenshaw of the Haida Nation. Haana participated in the CFSC delegation with the support of a grant from CFSC's Reconciliation Fund.

She was involved in presenting at two side events (one presentation was entirely in her Haida language) and gave an intervention on behalf of the Coalition for the Human Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

She also received multiple invitations to meet with different Indigenous and state delegations from around the world including a personal invitation from Carolyn Bennett, Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs, to attend a meeting at the Canadian Mission.

Breaking the Silence: Dialogue on Children of Incarcerated Parents



The report provides an overview of the dialogue presentations, policy discussions, and final recommendations of the group about Canada's role and responsibility to children of incarcerated parents.


The report and its recommendations are important contributions to the literature and research on children of incarcerated parents in Canada, and hopefully will propel action and change around this critical issue.

Giving thanks for two former Coordinators of CFSC

This year we've lost two people who were trailblazers for Canadian Friends Service Committee, both making immense contributions to Friends' service work and witness for justice and peace. Kathleen Schmitz-Hertzberg died in January, just before her 103rd birthday. She had not only coordinated the work of CFSC, but also worked for Toronto Monthly Meeting and Canadian Yearly Meeting. She was also deeply involved in many community service projects. Murray

Thomson died in May at age 96. In addition to coordinating CFSC's service work, Murray helped to found many peace groups, including Project Ploughshares (of which CFSC is still a member today). Right before his final trip to the hospital, Murray was still actively working to ban nuclear weapons.
