Criminal Justice Community Grants

CFSC's Criminal Justice community grants support projects that are consistent with CFSC's mandate and Quaker principles in both its goals and processes. CFSC funds projects with small grants annually (most projects funded are under \$500, with the maximum \$1,000).

CFSC Community Grant guidelines are as follows:

1. The project must:
 - support CFSC's mandate to actively prevent harm, repair harm and move beyond harm in relation to the justice system through means that are healing for all concerned and for society as a whole;
 - be consistent with [Quaker values in both its goals and process](#).
2. Stakeholders involved in the project have a voice regardless of political, religious, national or racial factors.
3. Rather than providing sustained core funding to established organizations, preference will be given to:
 - projects that others will not grant
 - seed money for new projects/initiatives
 - one-off kinds of projects
4. CFSC will also consider if there is a Friend (Quaker)/Monthly Meeting (Quaker Church) close to, or involved in, the project and geographic location of the project.

Application deadlines: **March 1** and **October 1**
Applications may also be accepted throughout
the year.

CFSC Community Grants Proposal Requirements

All proposals **must** include the following in (2-3 pages):

1. - Name of the project
 - Contact person
 - Address
 - Phone number
 - Email address
 - Sponsoring group/organization
 - Registered charitable number (if applicable)
 - Friend, Monthly Meeting or Worship Group (if applicable)

2. A short overview of the project or purpose for which assistance is requested that includes: the reason for undertaking the project, the goals of the project, who the stakeholders are and how they will be involved in the project, and how the project will be evaluated.

3. A brief description of how the project will actively prevent harm, repair harm and move beyond harm in relation to the justice system through means that are healing for all concerned and for society as a whole.

4. A brief description of the sponsoring group/organization for the project, how the work for the project will be carried out (e.g. by staff, volunteers, etc.) and timeframe.

5. Provide a brief budget for the project and indicate any other sources of funding that have contributed to the project. Indicate the amount that is being requested from CFSC and how it will be spent.

6. Indicate what involvement Friends (Quakers) have with the project if any. A minute of support should be included by the local Monthly Meeting (Quaker Church) if there is involvement from them or if this project is being led by a Friends' concern.

7. Provide any other information that you think may help in the assessment of your request.
